

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What is the terrain like?

A: Our country is very steep and rugged.

Q: What's the weather going to be like during my hunt?

*A: Weather is always unpredictable. For the most part September tends to be on the warmer side while October-November can be cold. What it really comes down to is to **be prepared for all weather possibilities!***

Q: What kind of footwear should I bring?

A: Hiking boots that fit you well and that you feel the most comfortable in. Waterproof is definitely a plus for crossing creeks, rain, and snow. It's a good idea to bring a pair of "camp shoes" for wearing around camp so you have a chance to get out of your boots at the end of every day.

Q: Should I bring my own spotting scope?

A: All of the guides usually carry a spotting scope with them, this is more of a personal preference.

Q: Is lodging available before or after my hunt?

A: We do have lodging available for the night before you ride into your hunting camp. Any lodging after your hunt is your responsibility to find.

Q: Will you drop me and my gear so I can hunt myself?

A: No, our schedules are too busy to do those types of requests.

Q: I didn't draw my out of state Idaho tag. Will you sell me one of your tags to hunt by myself?

A: No, law currently does not allow us to sell tags to people who do not hunt with us.

Q: Do I need to bring any food or drinks?

A: We provide food and drinks but if you would like to bring a few personal snacks or beverages that's totally fine!

Q: Is there a way for me to resight/check my gun after traveling?

A: Yes, the evening you arrive at our place you are more than welcome to go check/shoot your gun before you ride into camp the next day. We have a small gun range area at our place.

Q: Are there any local taxidermists around that could mount/euro my animal for me?

A: Yes, we have a few different places that we can give you the information too.

Q: Is there a local meat processor around that I can take my animal too?

A: Our local meat processor is usually booked pretty full during hunting season. Our best advice is to be prepared and have coolers (or get coolers after the hunt) to haul your meat back home to be processed.
